Senior Companion Program

Are you 55 or older, still active and driving? Could you give five hours a week to befriend lonely seniors who need companionship? Could you use extra cash in your wallet?

If you answered yes to these questions, you would be a perfect candidate for our program. It is as simple as how it sounds. Studies show that senior citizens who have someone to visit are healthier and happier than those who rarely or never see another person. Your companionship could make a significant difference in their lives. You will be matched with one or more clients you would visit on scheduled weekly visits. You would be required to spend five hours a week with your clients doing fun things, like playing cards, providing transportation to the grocery store, doctor's visits, or simply having friendly conversations.

The Senior Companion Program pays an hourly stipend for the time you spend with clients and reimburses you for mileage for trips to the store, etc. This program is not home health care or housekeeping but strictly companionship. You and your clients will agree on a schedule for the day and times you will visit.

The requirements are also quite simple. You will need to pass a background check, attend one-day orientation training, attend monthly In-Service Training, and fall within the income guidelines set by AmeriCorps Seniors. We've designed these steps to be straightforward and manageable, ensuring a smooth and enjoyable experience for both you and your clients.

You might be reading this and thinking, "I need a senior companion!" Great! We are looking for people who need companionship and have a simple form for you to complete. To qualify as a client, you must live alone or with family and provide your senior companion with a safe environment. Rest assured, we prioritize the safety and well-being of both our volunteers and clients, and we have measures in place to ensure a secure and comfortable experience for everyone involved.

Plant Corner

Houseplant winter care. If you received houseplants as gifts or bought them to liven up your homes, here are a few tips to help maximize their enjoyment. If you purchased or were given a poinsettia this holiday season, you can definitely keep these plants alive with some TLC. Try keeping them in a draft-free bright location without big temperature swings. Figuring out watering for these can be tricky. They don't like wet feet, so try to let them dry slightly in between waterings. Any holiday cactus you end up acquiring will benefit from similar treatment. As with any other houseplants, remember our homes are either cool or warm which can make watering tricky. Try to adjust the watering needs to fit the individual varieties. Keep all houseplants in as bright of location as you can. Near a window or with grow lights. Also remember to dust their leaves as that helps them absorb more sun and light. Library News

There is some exciting news to share regarding the future of the Juliaetta Community Library. After many years of service in our historic location at 205 Main Street in Juliaetta, we are preparing to move to a new space! In the fall of 2025, we will be opening a new branch at 501 Main Street in Kendrick, just a short distance away, where we'll continue to serve the community with even more resources and services.

Our current location holds a special place in the hearts of many. The building, originally the top floor of a two-story structure built in the 1890s, has been a landmark in Juliaetta. In the 1930s, the top floor was lowered onto a new foundation after the bottom half of the building was demolished. For decades, the space was used by the Order of the Rebekahs until the 1970s when the Rebekahs disbanded. The city acquired the building and offered it to the library to serve as a home for the growing community library.

This building has served the communities of Juliaetta and Kendrick continuously ever since, providing a gathering place for learning, reading, and community connection. However, over time, the age and condition of the building, along with its limited space, have made it increasingly difficult to accommodate the needs of our visitors and meet modern building standards.

While the move is bittersweet, we're excited about the new chapter ahead! The new library in Kendrick will be larger, safer, and more accessible. It will be fully compliant with up-to-date building codes, making it a more comfortable and inviting place for all members of the community to enjoy. We hope to create a space that continues the library's mission of serving the people of both Kendrick and Juliaetta for years to come.

We want to thank everyone for your continued support and understanding during this transition. The Juliaetta Library will remain open at 205 Main Street, Julietta until the Kendrick location is ready in the fall of 2025. During this time, we encourage you to continue visiting us for your library needs; and we appreciate your patience as we navigate the process of moving to our new home.

As a branch of the Latah County Library District, the Juliaetta Library is one of seven branches that offer vital library services throughout Latah County. Whether you are a regular visitor or a first-time guest, we are grateful for your ongoing interest and commitment to making our library a vibrant part of this community.

Stay tuned for more updates as we move closer to our opening in Kendrick. We look forward to welcoming you to our new space and continuing to provide a place for learning, creativity, and community connection!

The President's Lawyer by Lawrence Robbins. This book is a high stakes legal thriller with a "didn't see that one coming" type of ending. One word to describe this story: riveting!

Calamity of Souls by the award-winning author David Baldacci. Set in the tumultuous year of 1968 in southern Virginia, a racially-charged murder case sets a duo of white and black lawyers against a deeply unfair system as they work to defend their wrongfully-accused black defendant in a courtroom drama.

Government Gangsters by Kash Pramod. This author has recently been nominated to be the new head of the FBI. Is he qualified? Will he make drastic changes, and if so, why? This book is one man's observations and opinions. Having a peek into the inner workings of the politics in our Federal Government can be fascinating.

The Boyfriend by Freida McFadden. A new, twisting thriller from a #1 New York Times bestselling author. A dark story about obsession and the things we'll do for love. Hint: she is looking for the perfect man. He's looking for the perfect victim....

From Sharon Harris:

This past couple of months, my favorite author has been Jean Grainger. She penned the Knocknashe story and hooked me completely into her compelling Irish story. The first volume, *Lilac Ink*, introduces eighteen-year-old Grace Fitzgerald, a victim of polio who yearns to escape her fishing village. Richard Lewis lives across the Atlantic, is heir to a Savannah banking fortune which he does not want. As the world teeters on the brink of war in 1937, they forge a powerful connection.
