Whether you are considering a career that will require post graduation classes, internships, trade schools or college the KJ7 Education Foundation has tremendous opportunities waiting for you. •Applications are available from the Senior Counselor/Advisor at Kendrick Senior High School and must be submitted by April 15th.

Applications must be completed fully, accurately, and neatly.

•Applications may be typed or handwritten. Handwriting must be neat and legible.

•The student essay must be attached to the application.

A copy of the student high school transcript must be included.
Two letters of recommendation must be included: one from school staff and one from a community member familiar with the student's qualifications for this scholarship. *Rebecca Loomis*

Wastewater Treatment Plant Update

The city of Juliaetta has awarded the Wastewater Treatment Plant Construction Bid to Clearwater Construction. Construction is anticipated to occur over a 16-month period beginning in March 2025 and concluding on or before September 2026.

City of Juliaetta Emergency Preparedness Plan

Guests at the February 11th council meeting were: Steve Risken and Austin Cole, Latah Co Disaster Service Manager and Assistant Manager; Brian Nickerson, Fire Chief for Rural Fire Districts; Mike McManis, Fire Warden- Idaho Department of Lands; Jason Stokes, Latah Co Commissioner and Assistant Program Manager for Citizens Emergency Response Team; and Tony Johnson, Latah County Commissioner.

All of these men are part of a team that takes care of Latah County. Juliaetta is participating in the all hazard mitigation, county wildfire protection, and emergency operation plans. Every fire department, city, and town in the county is a participant in these plans. In case of emergencies, these entities will provide resources where citizens can get information. Latah County was the only County awarded two fire management assistance grants. Never before has Latah County been awarded this grant. These grants help with the costs of fighting the fires and makes Latah County eligible for more post-fire mitigation grants.

Public Nuisances

Juliaetta City Council would like everyone to do his or her part to help keep our City a nice place to live. An ordinance exists that outlines the requirements of residents and property owners. Do not allow trash, junk, or waste to accumulate. Do not allow anything to accumulate that could constitute a fire danger. This also includes keeping yards, shrubbery, and trees maintained. Unmaintained weeds and grass are considered public nuisances. Grass must be kept at a height of six inches or less on the whole property. Storage of non-operable vehicles, boats, campers and trailers, equipment, machinery, and parts is unlawful unless enclosed in a building or within sightobscuring fence which is to be kept in good condition.

Ordinances also exist for dogs at large. Please do not allow your animals to run around town.

CAMERON LUTHERAN CHURCH

Cameron Emmanuel is in a time of discernment. "What is that" you ask. Good question! The definition says the ability to make a smart judgement about something – a wise way of judging between things, or a particularly perceptive way of seeing things. Another says the three steps of discernment are: Awareness, Understanding, and Action.

As part of the process of calling a new pastor, members of Cameron met after worship, in a friendly atmosphere seated around tables with food (of course!) and each answered four questions: 1) Where were you born, 2) How did you get connected to this congregation, 3) What's one thing that you like most about this congregation, 4) In a pastor, what is one thing you look for.

The questions were answered with sincerity mixed with humor and interesting history from a group ranging from grade school to ninety-year-olds. The majority were born in this area. Over half were brought to church with their parents or grandparents; a quarter came through marriage, and a few joined after moving here.

Most liked the family atmosphere, the welcoming feeling of hospitality, caring and support, the music, the choir, the singing, the theology. Others like working together for outreach both locally and internationally through VBS, the work of the women's group (WELCA) making relief quilts, gathering items for care kits, school kits, raising funds for charities.

Folks want a pastor who gives a memorable sermon that leaves them thinking about it on the way home, who can engage through music and humor and can educate and explain things well; a good shepherd who cares and nurtures those in the congregation and community and can connect well with people, especially the younger generation. And facetiously, one wants someone good at repairs.

During Lent, which begins March 9, the women will be gathering items through April for Personal Care Kits which are distributed in disaster areas worldwide. Each kit contains one bath-size towel, 2 bars of soap, a toothbrush, sturdy comb, and nail clippers. Donations can be brought to the church anytime, or arrangements can be made to pick them up at the Senior Center.

All are welcome to Worship Services at 10:00 preceded by Adult Bible Study at 9:00 a.m. Palm Sunday, April 13, four of our youth will be confirmed; a brunch will follow worship. Easter will be celebrated April 20.

The charge for this course will be \$10.00.



The Book Nook

From Sharon Harris:

I am so happy to have found a new author that I love, Mark Sullivan, and he lives here in the northwestern U. S. in Montana. The first book I read was **All the Glimmering Stars.** It is based in Africa on the lives of Anthony Opoko and Florence Okori in the 1990s. This was a time when fanatical warlords swept through Uganda and neighboring nations forcing children into their fanatical work by brainwashing them. It is a powerful book of good overcoming seemingly insurmountable evil.

The best books are those based on true experiences, and Sullivan's second book, **Beneath a Scarlet Sky**, did not disappoint. It is based in Italy in World War II. Based on the story of a long-forgotten hero, Peno Lella, who is a teenager in Milan, Italy when Hitler invades the country. Follow his courage from helping Jews escape over the Alps to spying directly on the Nazis.

My third pick this month is a World War II novel by Alex Amit. *For My Child.* She is a German mother, struggling with Nazi policies and decisions while trying to maintain her "good German wife" image in her small community. A powerful story of love and sacrifice during the world's darkest hours.

Last, but certainly not least, *Churchill's Secret Messenger* by Alan Hlad, a thrilling story of a young lady who goes from typing reports for Churchill into the French Resistance to help defeat Hitler.

From Cheryl Rumbolz:

The Stolen Queen by Fiona Davis. A NY Times Bestseller from a NY Times bestselling author, an utterly addictive novel that will transport the reader from New York City's most glamorous party to the labyrinth streets of Cairo and back. This mystery is a page turner with a female heroine as the main character.

The Lotus Shoes by Jane Yang. A muizai is a mistress's shadow, there to do her bidding in 19th century China. This historical fiction book is an empowering and uplifting tale of two women from opposite sides of society.

The Edge by David Baldacci. This NY Times "multi times" bestselling author, has written another thriller that is a mystery crime fiction novel that has plenty of action when a former detective and a dangerous con artist go head-to-head over a family fortune.

Dinner For Vampires by Bethany Joy Lenz. A deliciously witty and inspiring memoir by One Tree Hill TV star Bethany Joy Lenz. This is a true story about how she ended up in a Cult that ran her life, stole her fortune, and how she eventually got out and survived.

Great Horned Owls

Owls are divided into 2 families: barn owls (*titonidae*) and all the others (*strigidae*), which includes the **Great Horned Owls**.



Great Horned Owls are large, thick-

bodied birds with 2 feathered tufts on the head. They are covered in extremely soft feathers that insulate against the cold winter weather and help them fly silently in pursuit of prey.

These birds are slightly larger than red-tailed hawks. They are mottled gray-brown, with reddish brown faces and neat white patches on the throat. Their overall color tone varies regionally from sooty to pale. The wings are broad and rounded. This wing-shape lets them maneuver among the trees of the forest. In flight, the rounded head and short bill combine to create a bluntheaded silhouette.

Great Horned Owls are capable predators, able to kill prey even larger than they are, including ospreys and other owls. When clenched, a Great Horned Owl's strong talons require a force of 28 pounds to open. The owls use this deadly grip to sever spines of large prey. They also eat small animals such as rodents, frogs and scorpions. Great horned owls are common in both North & South America, living and hunting in forests, deserts, wetlands, cities, and country sides.

You may see these nocturnal birds at dusk, sitting on fence posts or tree limbs at the edges of open areas or flying across roads with stiff, deep beats of their rounded wings. Their call is a deep, stuttering series of four to five hoots. Great Horned Owls typically sleep during the day and hunt at night. The rather flat face of many owls plus the facial disk (ridges of tiny hair-like feathers rim the **owl's** face) all direct sound to the ears. This enables owls to locate prey by the faint sounds of scurrying through grass and leaves.

Owls' immobile forward-facing eyes provide binocular vision and excellent depth perception. When they need to see anywhere other than straight ahead, they turn their heads - even more than 180° Their large eyes gather light so efficiently that they can hunt in semi-darkness.

Owls typically swallow their prey whole or at least in large chunks. The edible parts of the meal are broken down by the digestive system. Indigestible components, such as bones, are regurgitated as pellets. These accumulate on the ground and provide clues to favorite roosting sites. *E. Nora Abbott*
